WILLIAM BAYLIFF OF SMITH COUNTY TENNESSEE GRANTED TWO HUNDRED SIXTY FIVE ACRES ON WALKER CREEK 1833

To all to whom these presents shall come---greetings. Know ye that by virtue of Entry 1752 made the Day of April 1833. Made in the Entry-Takers Office of Smith County in pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of said State passed on the ninth Day of January one thousand eight hundred and thirty three.

Here is granted by the said State of Tennessee unto WILLIAM BAYLIFF a certain tract or Parcel of Land, containing TWO HUNDRED SIXTY FIVE ACRES by survey bearing the TENTH DAY OF APRIL 1833 being in said County on the waters of WALKER CREEK and bounded as followeth to wit. Beginning on a buckeye JONES north east corner. Thence East two hundred and twenty poles to a Sugar Tree thence northwest with his line Sixty Four poles to s Sugar Tree and thence south one hundred and sixty two poles to the beginning including his plantation.

With the hereditaments and appurtenances. To have and to hold the said Tract or Parcel of Land, with its appurtenances, to the said **WILLIAM BAYLIFF** and his heirs forever.

In witness whereof WILLIAM CARROLL Governor of the State of Tennessee hath hereunto set his hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Tennessee to be fixed at Nashville, on the day of MARCH BY THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED THIRTY FIVE and of the Independence of the United States the fifty ninth.
